Jaime Lissavetzky, Spain's Sport Secretary, is designated European representative to World Anti-Doping Agency

Athens, 12.12.2008 – Jaime Lissavetzky, Spain's Secretary of Sport, has been designated at the 11th Council of Europe Conference of Ministers responsible for Sport as the European representative in the World Anti-Doping Agency's (WADA) Executive Committee. Mr. Lissavetzky, Spain's Sport Secretary since April 2008, chaired from 2004 to 2007 the Ibero-american Council for Sport, an institution that groups 22 countries.

The ministerial conference during which this designation took place was co-organised by the Council of Europe and the Greek government on 11 and 12 December in Athens. It brought together over 100 participants from 44 countries, including sports ministers, sports federation and organisation officials (see our press release).

An international independent organisation created in 1999 to promote, coordinate, and monitor the fight against doping in sport, WADA is composed of a Foundation Board, an Executive Committee, and other committees. The 12-member Executive Committee is composed equally of representatives from the Olympic Movement and governments.

As European representative, Lissavetzky will aim to promote the European position prepared by the European Co-ordination Forum on the World Anti-Doping Agency (CAHAMA).
