Council of Europe Secretary General to visit Slovenia

Date: 31 March – 1 April 2009

Location: Ljubljana (Slovenia)

Description: Council of Europe Secretary General Terry Davis will visit Ljubljana for talks with Foreign Minister Samuel Žbogar as Slovenia prepares to take over the chairmanship of the organisation's Committee of Ministers, which begins in May and lasts until November.

Additional information: During the visit, the Secretary General will also meet Slovene President Danilo Türk, Prime Minister Borut Pahor, President of the National Assembly Pavel Gantar and members of the Slovene delegation to the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe.
