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


CONTEXT FOR CHANGE

- By 1974, the broad overall structure of Local Government we know today was put in place
- Complicated pattern of singe tier and two tier councils
- Since then around 7 different sets of reforms all aimed at improving governance in one way or another

Characteristics of change



- Changes driven by different processes
- Defined by three main characteristics
 - Top down approach initiative from Government
 - Recommendations from independent body
 - Bottom up approach proposals generated locally
- Processes include having regard to public opinion through eg consultation or referendum
- Regardless of process, Parliament is the final arbiter



Approaches – Top Down

- Legislation enacted providing for accountability to Parliament and the electorate
- Examples include
 - Abolition of GLC in 1986 and transfer of functions to London borough councils - provisions in Local Government Act 1985
 - Abolition of 6 Metropolitan county councils and transfer of functions to Metropolitan district councils in their areas – provisions also in Local Government Act 1985



Approaches – Top Down With Referendum

London

- Referendum in 1999 on establishing a new London authority and an elected mayor
- Greater London Authority Act 1999 established Greater London Authority (GLA) in 2000 and elections for mayor and London Assembly

Elsewhere in England

- Referendums in 10 largest cities in England required by Parliament in 2012
- Created first mayor for Bristol

Approaches – Independent Proposals

- Local Government Commission For England established 1992
 - First chair, Sir John Banham, followed by Sir David Cooksey
 - Role make recommendations to Government on future of local government after local consultations
 - Ultimately led to establishing 46 unitary councils between 1995 and 1998



Approaches – Bottom Up

- Structural Change 2009
 - Invitation issued by Government in October 2006 for areas to submit proposals for restructuring
 - Twenty six proposals received including competing proposals from some areas
 - Parliament approved creation of 9 new unitary councils from 1 April 2009
- Mayoral combined authorities
 - Negotiation with Government by 6 local areas
 - Creation of combined authority mayors and transfer of powers and functions to be exercised by mayors
 - Approved by Parliament
- Locally generated proposals for unitary councils and council mergers
 - Proposals received. Decisions for next Government
